## A WALK THROUGH THE GARDEN

As the closing of our second season nears I would like to thank the volunteers, students in the Horticulture Technician Program and summer students for making it possible to keep Milner Gardens and Woodland looking beautiful.

During October, our last open month this year, you can enjoy a great display of fall colours spread throughout the garden. Make sure to stop and look at all of the different trees and shrubs including our collection of Maples (*Acer spp.*) as they put on their big fall displays. There is also a great collection of late flowering perennials worth seeing such as the Blue Vervain (*Caryopteris x clandonensis* 'Dark Knight') by the pool, or the Bug Banes (*Cimicifuga simplex var. simplex* and *C. simplex*

'Brunette') down by the large Douglas fir. One fantastic late season bulb is Nerine (*Nerine bowdenii*) located up at the gift shop patio, along the driveway to the main house or in pots outside the main house or up by the patio. Come and get some ideas for late season interest at your own home.

Once the fall colours have faded, we will be looking forward to the spring's flowers. Our earliest Rhododendrons will start flowering in February. The Rhododendrons will be joined by the great collection of spring flowering shrubs, perennials and bulbs found throughout the garden.

## SNIPPETS

Some people may think that fall signifies a time to slow down. For the West Coast Gardener fall simply means we have nicer and cooler weather to work in before the rains set in! Dividing early flowering perennials is a great gardening task that can be done now. It's one of the easiest and most gratifying ways to propagate. Instant plants! The cool weather and moist days allow divided plants to heal in and establish their root systems before winter. Some early flowering perennials to divide now are: Iris, Pulmonaria, Soldanella, Epimedium, Primula, Geranium and many, many more.

The cooler, moister days also make it a great time for planting out. If you've been thinking about purchasing a tree, shrub, or some hardy perennials for your yard, now is the time to do so. To help you out with this task Milner Gardens and Woodland is having a **Fall Plant Sale**.

On **Saturday October 5<sup>th</sup>** and **Sunday October 6<sup>th</sup>**, Milner's will hold our first Fall Plant Sale. It will be located in the upper parking lot and we invite members and active volunteers to come and take advantage of the incredible prices. Most gallon perennials will be only \$6.00 and 10cm pots for only

\$3.00. All taxes included! We'll also have a great 'Move'em Out' section where select plants will be priced to GO! Be sure to bring your membership or volunteer card to access the savings.

To mark the event, all tickets into the gardens will be half price. This gives people who haven't had the chance to experience Milner Garden and Woodland a great opportunity to see the gardens in their fall glory. The gardens are a riot of colours and sights with many fall flowering perennials. It's my favourite time of year.

## HYDRANGEAS

---

I've been getting many questions lately about hydrangeas. Perhaps its because visitors to the Garden at this time of year can't help but notice our extensive collection, which are still very showy even as the season turns to Autumn. We have approximately 125 hydrangea plants, comprising 5 different species and numerous hybrids.

The species that highlights our collection is *H. macrophylla* ssp. *macrophylla*. Both the favourite mophead or pompom type and the lesser-known but beautiful lace-caps belong to this species. Near the Gardener's Cottage you won't miss the *H. paniculata* 'Grandiflora' or PeeGee hydrangeas, which can be trained into standards and will eventually become small trees in the landscape. The Oakleaf hydrangea (*H. quercifolia*) is a must have for the woodland garden, with their delicate panicle blooms and lobed leaves that turn deep magenta in the fall. Another interesting character is *H. aspera*, which has large, fuzzy leaves. And for anyone with a wall or fence



that needs a good cover, the climbing hydrangea (*H. anomala* ssp. *petiolaris*) is a great choice.

The question I've been hearing most often is how we get the beautiful shades of blue and deep purple in our flower heads. Flower colour in hydrangeas is dependent on the pH of the soil – acid soils (low pH) will produce blues and purples, while alkaline soils (higher pH) result in pink or red shades. Keep in mind that white hydrangeas don't change colour. To lower the pH of your soil and encourage your hydrangeas to show their blue colours you need to add aluminum sulphate. Do this according to package directions and remember that it takes time for the effects of the soil amendment to show. Don't dump on your soil amendment a week before the flowers open and expect great results!

The other question that's been coming up is when to prune. Most books say to prune after blooming but here at Milner Gardens we choose to leave the flower heads on the plants until early spring when the buds break. The blooms last late into the fall and turn many beautiful shades before they dry completely and go brown. By that time, the leaves have fallen and the shrub provides much needed winter interest. Think of a frosty winter day with dried hydrangea heads sparkling in the sunshine.

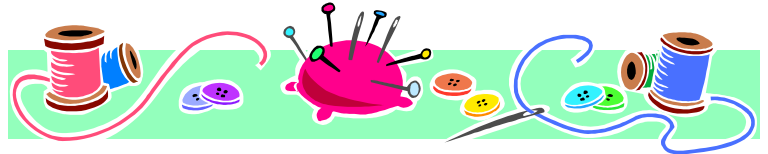

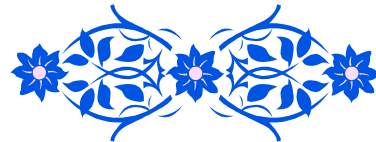
